



Domestic Animal Keeping Fact Sheet

HORSES

Local Law No. 4 (Animal Management) 2002 and Subordinate Local Law No. 4.1 (Animal Management) 2002 provide residents with consistent rules and recognise our urban, rural and semi-rural lifestyles.

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Under Logan City Council's animal keeping laws, the allowable number of horses varies, depending on the size of your property.

| Property size (square metres) | Allowable number |
|-------------------------------|--|
| 0 to 2,000 | 0 |
| 2,001 to 4,000 | 2 with Logan City Council approval. No stallions over two years of age. |
| 4,001 to 30,000 | 2 without Logan City Council approval (no stallions over two years of age) |
| | More than 2 (not including stallions over two years of age) at a density of 1 per 4,000 square metres with Logan City Council approval. NOTE: Keeping stallions over two years of age requires Logan City Council approval. |
| 30,000+ | Up to 20 at a density of no more than 1 per 4,000 square metres without Logan City Council approval, including no more than 2 stallions over two years of age without approval. |

Infant animals are not counted until the animals are 12 months of age or weaned

Enclosure requirements

Enclosures must be maintained in a clean and tidy state and constructed to:

- prevent the animal from escaping
- not be within 10 metres of a neighbouring dwelling
- not be within 10 metres of any premises operated for the purposes of the manufacture, preparation, storage or sale of food for human consumption
- be at least two metres from the boundary of the property

Enclosures for stallions must consist of double fencing around the perimeter of the area where the stallions are kept.

Approvals

NOTE: Keeping stallions over two years of age requires Logan City Council approval.

Development Approvals

Assessment is required under Council's planning scheme to keep more than the approved numbers, as this is considered a development activity.

Licensing requirements may also exist under Logan's Licensing Local Law or state law.

General requirements

The owner and keeper must ensure that keeping the horse/s does not result in:

- animal faeces build up
- breeding or harbouring of flies or vermin
- damage to property
- harm to human health or safety or personal injury
- nuisance
- significant disturbance, inconvenience or annoyance to a person's enjoyment of their place of residence
