FACT SHEET Accessible and Inclusive Design



What is accessible and inclusive design?

Accessible and inclusive design ensures that the needs of people with disabilities and mobility challenges are considered.

Beyond its obligations under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992*, Council aims to provide facilities, services and programs that are inclusive and promote participation by people with all abilities in the life of the City.

How does the Logan Planning Scheme 2015 promote accessible and inclusive design?

The Logan Planning Scheme 2015 requires that building work and operational work be designed and undertaken in accordance with Australian Standards and the National Construction Code where relevant. These standards have been developed in consideration of access and inclusion.

In addition, the Logan Planning Scheme 2015 makes several specific references to safe, accessible and inclusive design. These references are outlined below.

Queensland Government's Wayfinding Design Guidelines

Council encourages development that progresses beyond statutory requirements for accessible and inclusive design. Council actively encourages development to consider the design measures outlined in the Queensland Government's Wayfinding Design Guidelines.

Way finding aims to ensure that people with a sensory impairment know where they are in a building or an environment, where their desired location is and how to get there from their present location.

The Wayfinding Design Guidelines identify a number of strategies and solutions for the four primary way finding elements, being architectural, graphic, audible and tactile communication.
