

SOUTHSIDE UPCYCLING STITCHERS COLLECTIVE

Stitched together will showcase recent outcomes from the Southside Upcycling Stitchers Collective. The collective of local artists and makers use fabric waste, donated clothing and sewing to upcycle and transform garments. For collective members, the clothing becomes a canvas for hand stitched detail, using all kinds of threads. Members have also created earrings, necklaces and brooches from fabric and wool scraps using recycled material.






Home and habitat

The exhibition features new paintings, photography and wood craft and will focus on how Aboriginal culture and knowledge is passed down through family connections.

Hidden in the folds

CHRYS ZANTIS

Hidden in the folds is a solo exhibition by Springwood artist Chrys Zantis, which explores various aspects of brain function. Chrys combines design, textiles and photography to explore the connection – and sometimes disconnection – between the brain's internal and external worlds. This body of work follows from an Artist-in-residency with the Cognitive Neuroscience and Computational Psychiatric Laboratory at Melbourne School of Psychological Sciences at Melbourne University.
