Reflecting on 2022: adversity, achievements and a strong community

he festive season is always a time of reflection for me. It's a moment to look at the year behind us, the year ahead and just pause in the moment.

The year certainly started off a little differently than we all had hoped when our city endured an extremely challenging time as we faced the worst flooding since 1974. However, in the face of this challenge I was proud of this great city and the way people supported and cared for each other.

Off the back of this adversity, we were able to celebrate some significant milestones for our city. In April, we opened the \$28 million biosolids gasification facility at the Loganholme Wastewater Treatment Plant. Council has pioneered an Australian-first facility that transforms human waste into renewable energy and an environmentally-friendly, marketable product called biochar.

In May, we officially opened the city's newest entertainment precinct, the Kingston Butter Factory (KBF) Cultural Precinct. Taking shape during one of the most unpredictable times in recent history, the KBF Cultural Precinct quite literally was a labour of love. Our outdoor venue has already hosted several significant outdoor events.

As Logan is one of the fastest growing cities in South East Queensland, I was delighted to welcome an application from Australian Unity for a \$150 million health hub development in Meadowbrook. This is a turning point for our city and could help alleviate the overwhelming demand from residents wanting access to medical services close to home.

In June, we delivered the 2022/23 Budget, including an initial commitment of \$38 million over 5 years towards grassroots sports to improve facilities at local sporting clubs. It was a responsible and considered budget as we know many people are feeling the increased pressures from the rising cost of living. It was the lowest bottom line rate rise in South East Queensland of 2.49 per cent for ratepayers on the minimum general rate.

In October, we proudly unveiled the Jodie Henry Pool at the Logan North Aquatic Centre. Council is proud to invest in world-class facilities and the new Jodie Henry Pool is a celebration of one our city's greatest sporting heroes.

Jodie is truly a wonderful example of what it means to come from humble beginnings and become a world-class star through hard work and dedication.

On a festive note, I hope that everyone is able to spend quality time with family and loved ones.

However, Christmas can be a challenging time for some people in our community. I urge you take care of one another, check in on families and friends or those that are most vulnerable and spare a thought for those doing it tough.

I for one am looking forward to 2023 and all that it holds for the City of Logan.

On behalf of my fellow Councillors, I wish you and your loved ones a Merry Christmas and a happy and prosperous new year.



Festive cheer — and some trade secrets — from the man in red

or millions of children and the young at heart, the twinkly eyes, booming laugh and red suit of Santa symbolise more than just Christmas: they symbolise magic, childhood, and fantasy. He's universal, omnipresent and the subject of countless stories, songs, myths and traditions.

And, proving that the City of Logan is the best place to be at Christmas, Santa's been hanging out here for the past 15 years. Santa is 1,748 years old this year – and for the past 15 years, he has headed up the Christmas festivities at Logan Hyperdome to chat with thousands of children about their Christmas wishes.

Santa – who is also known as Col Myers in the months between January and November — says no matter how much time passes and how much things change, one thing always stays the same.

as that. I talk to kids from all over the
world, who may not be Christian or
celebrate Christmas in the traditional
way — but they love Santa.

'The story is a symbol of childhood and magic.'

There are plenty of curious young minds trying to find out if Santa is real and if it is really him, according to Col.

'The most common question I get is "are you REALLY Santa". When I get asked that, I take my hat off' – revealing a head of thick white hair – 'lean forward, and ask them, what do YOU think?'

With his white hair, beard, twinkling eyes and deep, infectious laugh – it's easy to see why this is all it takes to convince children that Santa Col is, indeed, the real deal.

In good news for children across the world, Santa doesn't believe in a naughty list.

'I don't like the idea of telling kids they won't get presents if they have been naughty – all kids are the same, but some do find it harder not to be naughty than others,' he says.

'What I do tell the kids is that they may not realise it, but the adults in their lives have my mobile phone number and they call to tell me about what they think is appropriate for their kids at Christmas.'

While Santa Col says he has been cried on, thrown up on and been told secrets – there's nothing he loves more than talking to children during the festive season.

'I love it, I love everything about it. Christmas is my time,' he says.

His latest venture, Perentie Brewing Co., is a \$6 million and 1-million litre brewery and taphouse designed for the community.

The long-time lager aficionado says while he believes Perentie will attract people from outside the area, it's for locals first and foremost.

'We want locals to come in and be proud of this lager that is produced in their community,' Kenton says. 66

We will have a beer garden, outdoor and indoor areas, entertainment – it will be world class.

'We want this to offer a localised experience. Since DRM opened, I have seen there is a sense of pride in this area and an appreciation for what we have here, so I want to honour that.

When Kiwanda Café and Sugar Creek Smokehouse at the precinct first opened, Kenton worked at both places as a dishwasher for 5 weeks.

'I wanted to ensure staff had what they needed, and I also wanted to meet customers and hear what they were thinking,' he says.

'It was then I realised how much the community wanted something like what we are creating – something central that would also bring people in from outside the area. Perentie will do that.'

Perentie Brewing Co. sees Kenton collaborate with long-time friend Brennan Fielding of Burleigh Brewing. The pair previously collaborated on Black Giraffe, a black coffee lager that won a range of awards.

For Brennan, coming on as an advisor to Kenton was a no-brainer.

'I've known Kenton since 2008 when his coffee business was growing and our brewery was new so there were synergies between us,' he says.

'We have always worked well together, and it is great fun to see it all coming together. When people see it, I think they will be blown away.

'We can't wait to be sitting enjoying a beer, and seeing others enjoy the beers we have manufactured.'

Perentie Brewing Co. will launch in the DRM's 17,000 sqm precinct in mid-2023.

'If you could put a dollar value on the volunteer hours in Logan from people running the charities in their neighbourhoods, it would be absolutely massive. 'It would be great for us to shine a light on their efforts and on that intangible spirit of Logan. We want to work with them, help them in their goals, and make an impact.'

Company Secretary and Director James Stokes says Logan is well known as a place where there is an abundance of great work happening in the not-for-profit space.

'This city is innovative and there is so much work that is being done,' he says.

'We want to focus on the future of children and young people and leveraging how we, as a community board that governs where our funds go, can work with the existing established framework and have an impact in ensuring money goes where it is most needed.'

The Trust is currently also looking for organisations, philanthropists, donors and partners to work with.

Learning to sing and connect

very Friday morning, around 35 people gather in a room. Some live with conditions like bipolar or post-traumatic stress disorder, while others are unable to read.

Some struggle to even get out of bed in the morning.

Despite those challenges, the group manages to accomplish something that most people fear: performing in public, as part of the Absolutely Everybody Brisbane Choir.

This choral group, run by Upbeat Arts and funded for adults dealing with hardship or mental illness, will be performing at this year's City of Logan Christmas Carols at Griffith University Campus on 10 December.

Operations manager Susan Gilmartin says the choir is about much more than singing.

'Although we take great pride in our vocal ability, it's about creating a sense of community for those that need it most,' she says.

'Some of our people wouldn't fit in a regular community choir, but are welcomed, respected and accepted into our program.' Unlike other choirs, there's no pressure to perform and everyone is allocated a buddy for support.

The group also enjoys a free lunch after every weekly 2-hour session, which involves vocal exercises and performance prep.

'One young lady used to come by with a support worker and leave after 5 minutes. She now happily performs on stage and has recently travelled overseas on exchange,' Susan says.

'Others have gone on to university or paid work, while some stay with us forever. It's our goal to equip people with the skills to follow their dreams, whatever they may be.'

For the singers, the choir has been life-changing.

Adults with disabilities can often feel unseen and lonely.

'That's the joy of this choir – they get to see their friends and have something of value to do every Friday outside of therapy,' Susan says.

'It gives them the opportunity to be applauded and recognised for their hard work – they're so appreciative of Logan City Council for the opportunity to be seen and heard.

It's about creating a sense of community for those that need it most.

'It's not therapy, but it is therapeutic. We've had people tell us that they wouldn't still be here if the choir didn't exist.'

Top spots to find wildlife in Logan

ou can find plenty of Aussie wildlife here in Logan. We've compiled some top spots for those who want to unleash their inner David Attenborough – or simply enjoy a walk through the gorgeous natural landscape in our city.

Logan's wetlands

Berrinba and Eagleby Wetlands are a rich source of wildlife. Locals report seeing raptors soaring in the sky, reptiles around the water, and beautiful bird life. Hot tip: head down at dusk to see wallabies in open grass areas or possums and gliders in the trees.

Spring Mountain Reserve

At this hidden gem in Greenbank, you'll see some beautiful bird life and butterflies, as well as eastern grey kangaroos at dusk and dawn enjoying the grassy areas.

Alexander Clark Park, Loganholme

This popular park is renowned for koala sightings. There's also a colourful bird population.

Daisy Hill Conservation Park

Swamp and red-necked wallabies, eastern water dragons, glossy black-cockatoos and some gorgeous bird life could be your picnic companions at this popular spot.

Cornubia Forest Park

This forest is rich in wildlife, with regular sightings of wallabies, possums, reptiles and birds, as well as the occasional short-beaked echidna and koala.

Plunkett Conservation Park, Cedar Creek

Birds and insects are common in spring during wildflower season. The rocky outcrops are the perfect place to spot reptiles and wallabies. Gliders, echidnas, koalas and owls have also been seen.

Springwood Conservation Park

This is a great spot to see short-beaked echidnas, lizards, wallabies, possums and gliders. Nocturnal and diurnal bird life can also be found.

Alberta Park, Wolffdene

Head here at dawn or dusk to try and spot a platypus. Hot tip: Logan City Council conducts PlatypusWatch events, look out for these at

Boronia Bushland Reserve

Eastern grey kangaroos are regularly spotted, and frogs during the wetter months. Gliders, possums and flying foxes can be found at dusk and during the evening. Birds are also common. If you head to one of the natural areas above and see some wildlife, tag us! You can also submit your pictures to iNaturalist.org.

Slick moves with a practical purpose

heelchair Motocross, or WCMX, has been a key part of Tim Lachlan's life for 14 years – and it's not just skate parks where the moves come in handy.

As the first Australian to land a wheelchair backflip – which he did in 2016 – Tim found there was a range of practical ways his skate skills were useful.

Jumping kerbs, using stairs, or otherwise navigating spaces that aren't wheelchair accessible has been an extra benefit for Tim, who has spina bifida and Ehlers Danlos syndrome.

It's also something the Holmview resident shared in a number of workshops held across Australia.

'I put a priority on wheelchair skills, but in an environment that is fun and engaging for everyone,' he says.

'People would come with no idea how to do a wheelie, for example, and when they left, they would know what skills to work on and how to improve.' Tim is completing his Bachelor's in Occupational Therapy, and plans to combine WCMX with occupational therapy.

Tims says while WCMX is useful in helping to navigate spaces, it's not a solution to the problem of wheelchair accessibility.

'Just because I can do these tricks to get up stairs or over kerbs doesn't mean everyone will be able to. More disability access is really important and benefits everyone,' he says.

love of Bondi Rescue, a willingness to try out new things, and a knack for great teamwork has led Olivia Ramsay and Reyce Hughes to secure jobs as Aqualogan lifeguards.

Olivia recently finished Year 11 at Browns Plains State High and Reyce is a 2022 graduate of Trinity College in Beenleigh. They also recently completed a youth pool lifeguard program, developed by Nyerroolahle Logan and delivered by Logan Council's Community Services, Aqualogan and Royal Life Saving Queensland. Olivia and Reyce were among a group of young Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people who completed the course.

'I always loved Bondi Rescue

– so when I started the course it was something I was interested in but had never seen myself doing, but by the time we got to the end of the second day, I knew I could see myself doing it,' Olivia says.

Reyce was keen to jump straight into the role after completing the course.

'I really enjoyed working under pressure and as a team,' he says.

'We were given this great opportunity and I feel really proud to be working as a lifeguard.'

There are major shortages in the aquatic industry at the moment with hundreds of vacancies in South East Queensland alone.



Australia's newest donation centre now operates on Barbaralla Drive at Springwood.

Staff there expect to receive more than 22,000 donations over the next year.

As a former intensive care nurse, Councillor Lisa Bradley has seen firsthand the positive benefits of donating and strongly encourages people to visit the centre and donate blood and plasma ahead of the festive season.

'Christmas can be a challenging time for Lifeblood with many regular donors unavailable, so we encourage all those who can to roll up their sleeves and donate,' she says.

'The need for blood and blood products never stops and donating only takes an hour of your time but it means a lot to all those it helps.' Lifeblood's Blood Service spokesperson Belinda Smetioukh says blood transfusions are required somewhere in Australia every 24 seconds and thousands of donors are needed before the holidays get into full swing.

Springwood resident Adrian Wheatley made 113 blood donations until a medical condition meant he could no longer donate.

So he became a volunteer at the Springwood centre and has spent the last 6 years helping donors and supporting Lifeblood's vital work.

Masterly upgrade for Springwood Park

new dog off-leash area and carpark are included in the first phase of a masterplan upgrade for Springwood Park.

The replacement of the existing toilet block and barbecue area with new facilities under the Asset Replacement Program is also hoped to be completed before Christmas (weather permitting).

The entry road will be made one way, with parking both sides, including disability parking.

The project includes Division 1 Local Infrastructure Program funding of more than \$1.07 million.

he next generation of local sports stars could be on their way to Olympic glory as swimmers lap up the new facilities at Logan North Aquatic Centre.

The centrepiece of the \$9 million upgrade at Underwood is the Jodie Henry Pool, named after one of the City of Logan's greatest products.

deas submitted by the local skate community have been incorporated into the upgrade and extension of the Crestmead Skate Park.

Councillor Jon Raven, Council officers and designers met with local skate enthusiasts earlier this year and their feedback helped shaped the final designs for the park upgrade.

The nearly \$800,000 project at the popular facility, located behind the PCYC in Gimlet Street, will include:

- new lighting for the skate park
- a set-up combination unit and new 1.8 metre quarter pipes
- replacement of an existing stair set
- removal of obstructing items to allow smoother transitions to the new ramps
- other embellishments across the park.

'This exciting new space for local skaters is going to be worth the wait because we designed it based on what you told us you wanted,' Cr Raven says.

The upgrade should be completed by the end of the year, weather permitting. The project is funded through the Division 5 Local Infrastructure Program.

Planning is also proceeding on Waterford West District Sports Park (between Chambers Flat Road and Marsden State High School's sports fields).

Preliminary works are expected to start next year. It will be one of the biggest park developments in the City of Logan in recent years.

Project aims to deliver food for everyone

n important community-based food security project is growing fast across
Division 6.

Councillor Tony Hall realises food security for people in need is one of the largest growing concerns in the City of Logan.

To help overcome this, he has been working closely with representatives from Griffith University Logan Campus at Meadowbrook, Loganlea High School, non-profit Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander organisation Gunya Meta Inc., food relief charity The Mini Farm Project and Council's CityStudio Logan program.

The project, which targets and involves local youth, aims to create a better understanding of our local food future and includes the creation of a 66-bed urban farm at Loganlea State High School, where the first plantings should begin early next year.

Cr Hall supported this project as one of the first to personally fund a bed. All plots fully funded by local businesses, charitable organisations and residents who want to help. Produce grown will be given to students in need and local charities.

Cr Hall also was a speaker and review panellist at Griffith University and CityStudio Logan's showcase presentation on integrating Indigenous cultural knowledge within local food planning.

Presentations were made by first year Environmental Planning students and followed an engagement in August where they workshopped important food security questions with First Nations people.

'I was extremely impressed with the professionalism of these students and look forward to working with them in the future,' Cr Hall says.

'More than 47,000 people in the Logan region require food assistance every day so any gains we can make on food supply and security are extremely important.'



he foundations for a better future were laid at a recent family fun day at Meadowbrook.

The Logan Together movement hosted Splash! at Griffith University Logan Campus.

It aimed to use fun activities for children and educational discussion for their carers to deliver a collective approach to immediate and long-term social change.

About 600 people attended Splash!.

'On the surface, it was a fun family event but behind the scenes was this amazing collaborative work aimed at ensuring every child in the City of Logan has every opportunity to be the very best they can be,' Councillor Tony Hall says.

'I know some wonderful ideas and suggestions were raised and I look forward to seeing the Collective Plan when it is finalised.'



Be patient around Flagstone roadworks

orks are underway in
Flagstone to improve the
condition of Bushman Drive.
Council is repairing a 3.6 km section
of the road from the Flagstone Central
Shopping Centre to just south of
Blacksmith Court.

Councillor Natalie Willcocks says the 3-month project will mostly be completed between 6 am and 6 pm, Monday to Saturday, but some intersection works may be completed at night.

'Bushman Drive is one of the main roads in and out of Flagstone, so I encourage people to plan ahead and allow extra travel time,' Cr Willcocks says.

'There will also be changed traffic conditions including reduced speed limits and lane closures.' Council's contractor will notify affected residents of any localised impacts such as temporary restrictions to accessing driveways.

'We appreciate everyone's patience while these essential works are completed,' Cr Willcocks says.
