THE SKEEN MOB

Greenbank First Nations artist, Jessica Skeen-McKinnon (Widi, Biri, and Kuku Thaypan), has curated a group exhibition of works by her family members. Many Skeen family members are also artists and craftspeople having learnt skills from their renowned artist father, Uncle Joseph Skeen. The exhibition features new paintings, photography and wood craft and will focus on how Aboriginal culture and knowledge is passed down through family connections.

The interior

NATALYA HUGHES

The interior is an immersive installation combining sculptural seating, richly patterned soft furnishings, 3D printed sculptures and a wall mural. The artist Natalya Hughes is interested in the role of women and their historical absence from positions of power. The part-professional, part-domestic setting conjured by The Interior plays with gendered power dynamics between public and private spaces.

Interlace is an exhibition of contemporary lace by artists whose work centres on lacemaking.

Australasian Contemporary Lacemakers is a small and dedicated group of Australian and New Zealand contemporary lacemakers who have come together to share and further the practice and public awareness of contemporary lacemaking in Australasia.

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Archaeology of memory


SHA SAWARI

World Environment Day posters


World Environment Day posters brings together a collection of vibrant artworks designed by Logan's young artists. World Environment Day is an annual global event for positive environmental action.

The Pride of Logan

PAMELA SEE

The Pride of Logan is the name of a schooner, built near the Logan River in 1872. Using silhouette portraits and paper effigies, this exhibition investigates the ship, some of its occupants and cargo. This will be exhibited with another series of papercuts created to commemorate the Kingston Butter Factory, its former occupants and their associated artefacts.


